STUDENT SUPPORT FOR HIGHER EDUCATION IN ENGLAND, ACADEMIC YEAR 2009/10 (PROVISIONAL)

INTRODUCTION

1. This statistical first release presents provisional figures for academic year 2009/10 on Higher Education (HE) student support to English domiciled students studying in the UK and to EU students studying in England. It also shows final figures for at least the previous two academic years.
2. These figures relate to full-time undergraduate students and to postgraduate students who are studying in an Initial Teacher Training (ITT) course on a full-time, part-time or flexible basis. All other part-time students and postgraduate students are excluded.
3. A new table has been introduced this year to show the total amount of support awarded per student support product.

IMPORTANT NOTE

4. The figures for the current academic year (2009/10) are provisional, and are based on the status of applications processed by mid November. Processing of applications continues after that date, for example because of late applications and reassessments or where applications are cancelled because the applicant has not started an HE course. Final figures incorporating the effect of this later processing are normally published in the following November.
5. Since 2004, when provisional figures were published in this way, the position in mid-November has always been broadly comparable to the position at the same point in the previous academic year. However, in 2009/10 the mid-November position is not directly comparable. This is because the SLC took precautions to ensure that all those who were affected by the recent delays in processing were awarded a non-means tested loan assessment as an interim measure.
6. Although a similar number of applications have been processed, this measure is likely to have affected the proportion of applicants who are eligible for a partial or full maintenance grant, and who are due to be reassessed to establish their correct entitlement. It is expected that the percentage receiving the full and partial maintenance grants in Table 3A will be higher in the final out-turn

by more than the historically observed 1-3%. Updates of the maintenance grant figures for 2009/10 entrants (based on Table 3A) will be published in January and March 2010, as well as in the final figures in November 2010.

KEY POINTS

Total amount of student support awarded (Table 2a)

7. In academic year 2009/10, the provisional total amount of support awarded, based on data at 15 November, was £6,302m.
8. The final figure for 2008/09 was £5,955m which represents an 18% increase on academic year 2007/08 (£5,034m).

Total number of awards to English domiciles (Table 2b)

9. The provisional number of students being awarded support, in the form of loans and grants, in academic year 2009/10 was 838,600.
10. The equivalent final figure for academic year 2008/09 was 872,900 which represents 4% (36,700) more students awarded support compared to the previous academic year.

Awards of maintenance grants (Table 3a)

11. As of 15 November this year provisional figures show that 294,000 students successfully applied for support in academic year 2009/10 under the 2009/10 entry regulations. As explained above, following the measures that were put in place over the summer 2009 to process new entrants' applications, the provisional distribution is not comparable with previous years, nor is it likely to be indicative of the final picture. The current figures show that 33% of 2009 entry cohort students were awarded the full maintenance grant of £2,906, 21% were awarded a partial maintenance grant and finally, 46% were awarded no maintenance grant.
12. Final figures for 2008/09 show that 759,000 students were eligible to be assessed for support in the form of maintenance grants in academic year 2008/09 under the 2006/07 entry regulations, which represents an increase of 44% compared to academic year 2007/08.

Average awards of maintenance loans (Table 4a)

13. The provisional figures for academic year 2009/10 indicate that 749,000 maintenance loans were taken out which amounts to £2,704m borrowed. On average, students took out an income contingent maintenance loan worth £3,610.
14. The equivalent final figure for academic year 2008/09 shows that, on average, students took out a maintenance loan of £3,520 which is similar to the previous year.

Average take-up of tuition fee loans (Table 4b)

15. 791,000 English domiciled students applying under the 2006/07 entry regulations took out a tuition fee loan in academic year 2009/10 (provisional) at an average rate of £3,030 per student

REVISIONS

16. Previous statistical first releases showed the average maintenance grant and allowances awarded per student in table 2B (previously table 2). This has been discontinued because the calculation included students not entitled to a maintenance grant or allowances.
17. The corrections and revisions that were introduced to the figures published previously have been carried forward in this statistical first release (for details see SLC SFR05/2008).

26. Table 4B shows the number of tuition fee loans taken out, the amount borrowed and the average loan value for the student support scheme for all students domiciled in England and for European Union students attending HE courses in England pre- versus post 2006/07 arrangements, between academic years 2007/08 and 2009/10.
27. Table 4C shows the number of tuition fee loans taken out, the amount borrowed and the average loan value for the student support scheme for all students domiciled in England broken down by England and other UK countries of HE institution attended between academic years 2007/08 and 2009/10.

NOTES FOR EDITORS

28. All of the figures in this first release have been compiled by the Student Loans Company Limited (SLC). All student numbers have been rounded to the nearest 100 unless specified otherwise. All

amounts have been rounded to the nearest £100,000 unless specified otherwise. All totals and averages are calculated from un-rounded numbers.

29. Details of the amounts of loans and grants available in academic year 2009/10 are publicly available in the Student Finance England booklet 'A guide to financial support for higher education students in 2009/10'.
30. This statistical first release contains early in-year awards figures for academic year 2009/10. Students who have not yet been approved for support will not appear in these figures (see paragraphs 4 to 6 for more details). Some eligible students may not have applied yet and others may have applied but not yet provided all requested evidence. Also, student's circumstances can change and they may revise their support application. Significant numbers of students revise their initial support application from non means-tested support to means-tested support. Others withdraw from their courses after only one term's payment. Therefore, the figures for academic year 2009/10 are provisional.
31. Due to high levels of public interest in the processing of Higher Education Student Support applications by Student Finance England, the Student Loans Company, in conjunction with BIS analysts have released early provisional figures to show the levels of processing and payment of Student Support in England for the 2009/10 academic year. These were published on the SLC website under "Facts & figures" and are accessible at http://www.slc.co.uk/statistics/facts_figures.html. Figures in this SFR are based on more up-to-date information.
32. The components of Table 2a & 2b are taken from SLC's Management Information System, which hosts data from the company's operational systems. An issue was discovered with the way certain data was being loaded into the Management Information System. This issue caused the disabled students allowance component of table 2a & 2b to be understated in the original release of this SFR. The error has been corrected in this re-issue.

THE STUDENT FINANCE SYSTEM

Summary of recent policy changes:

2009/10 entrants

33. Maintenance grant -- The main change for new entrants in 2009/10 is an adjustment to the household income threshold for maintenance grant support. Although the threshold for entitlement to a maximum grant remains at £25,000, the threshold for entitlement to a partial grant has been adjusted from £60,005 to £50,020.
34. Maintenance loan -- The non means tested element of the maintenance loan has been adjusted - from 75% to 72% of the maximum loan amount. As a result, the means tested element of the maintenance loan has been adjusted from 25% to 28% of the maximum loan amount. The amount of maintenance loan available is reduced by £0.50 for every £1 of maintenance grant received. The maximum amount of support available is therefore lower than the sum of the maximum maintenance loan and the maximum maintenance grant.
35. Tax year -- In 2009/10, new policy meant that students could supply UK tax system based financial evidence for previous tax year for assessment of their 2009/10 application. For 2009/10, this meant that applicants could supply their P60 for the 2007/08 tax year, along with any other financial evidence which may be required, when being assessed for means tested financial support. This allows applicants to apply for student support earlier than in previous years.

2008/09 entrants

36. Maintenance grant -- For students entering HE in September 2008 the income thresholds for maintenance grant support were revised. The income threshold for full grant entitlement was increased from £17,910 in academic year 2007/08 to £25,000 in academic year 2008/09. The income threshold for the minimum partial grant was increased from £38,330 to £60,005.

2007/08 entrants

37. New student support arrangements were introduced for students entering HE from September 2006. Students are eligible for the maintenance grant, dependent on household income. Students studying in England became subject to tuition fees. Loans to cover the cost of fees are available which students start to repay when they have left higher education and are earning over £15,000. Students continue to be eligible for a maintenance loan.

Key elements of the student support arrangements introduced in 2006/07

Maintenance grant

38. A maintenance grant was introduced for students who started their course in September 2006 and were subject to variable tuition fees. These students were termed 'current system' students. The new maintenance grant replaced the higher education grant.
39. Under the new arrangements, the maximum amount of grant available in academic year 2009/10 is £2,906, and how much a student receives depends on their income, the income of their household, and their year of entry into higher education. Students receive the full grant of £2,906 if they are 2008 or 2009 entrants with a household income up to £25,000, or if they are 2006 or 2007 entrants with a household income up to £18,360. Students receive a partial grant, with a minimum grant of £50, if they are 2009 entrants with a household income up to £50,020, if they are 2008 entrants with a household income up to £60,005, or if they are 2006 or 2007 entrants with a household income up to £39,333. The equivalent special support grant (of up to £2,835) ensures that students in the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) vulnerable groups have their grant disregarded when entitlement to benefits is calculated.

Tuition fee loans

40. From academic year 2006/07, students can defer payment of tuition fees by taking out a Tuition Fee loan. As well as being available to 'current system' students, this option is also available to pre-2006/07 entrants if they make a full or partial contribution to their fixed fees. Students can take out as much or as little fee loan as they choose, up to the maximum amount of fees being charged.

Additional grants and allowances

41. The Government retains as grants and allowances those relating to the personal circumstances of students, e. g. for adult dependant grant, child care grant, parents' learning allowance and disabled students allowances (DSA). Support for some course-related costs, e.g. long course learning, is in the form of supplementary loans. Targeted grants with the exception of DSA are income-assessed.

Access to learning fund

42. From academic year 2004/05 hardship funding was amalgamated into one non-repayable fund, renamed the Access to Learning Fund. Institutions with HE students were allocated funding from BIS to help students from low income backgrounds and those in financial difficulty to gain access to and stay in HE.

Key elements of the student support arrangements introduced in 1998/99

43. New students in 1998/99 received support for maintenance through means-tested grants (comprising about a quarter of the support available) and non income-assessed student loans (comprising about three quarters of the support available). New students from 1999/00, and those who were subject to the new arrangements in 1998/99, receive support for living costs mainly through loans which are partly income-assessed. The loans made under these arrangements are repayable on an income contingent basis.

Student loans

44. Repayment of student support scheme loans is linked to income after leaving university or college so that leavers only repay as and when they can afford to. Repayments are at the rate of 9% of income above the income threshold (which was £10,000 up until the end of March 2005 and then £15,000 for all borrowers from April 2005 onwards).

RELATED PUBLICATIONS

45. Statistics on loans and grants awarded to students in HE in England in academic year 2008/09 (provisional) were published in SLC SFR 05/2008 on 27 November 2008.
46. Statistics on the repayment of loans in financial year 2008-09 (provisional) were published on 17 Jun 2009 in SLC SFR 02/2009 and revised on 22 October 2009.
47. Additional statistics on income contingent repayments by repayment cohort and tax year 2000/01 to 2007/08 inclusive (provisional) were published on 22 October 2009.
48. Early provisional statistics on the levels of processing and payment of Student Support in England for the 2009/10 academic year were published on 27 October, 3 November and 10 November 2009.

NATIONAL STATISTICS

49. This is a National Statistics publication. National Statistics are produced to high professional standards set out in The Code for Official Statistics. They undergo regular quality assurance reviews to ensure they meet customer needs. They are produced free from any political interference.
